10.	Aims of the course program	This subject is dealing with fundamental and general principles of International Criminal Law as scientific discipline, as well as with elements of international crimes. Students can gain knowledge of war crimes, crimes against humanity, genocide, torture, aggression and terrorism as international crime. They study also following institutes: jurisdiction of states, extradition, asylum, recognizing and executing foreign crimes judgments, transfer of crime procedure. In current situation when many international and mixed courts for war crimes have been established, students should be especially familiar with Nurnberg and Tokyo tribunals, ad hoc tribunals, as well as with establishing and organization of International Criminal Court. The knowledge gained would enable them to recognize and critical elaborate main elements leading to court procedure and judgments for war crimes in former Yugoslavia, as well as main cases before International Criminal Court.
