Aims of the course program	Status of the Republic of Macedonia as state candidate for join NATO, as well as participation of members of Macedonian armed forces and police in NATO missions and in Peacekeeping forces of UN, underlined the necessity of learning rules and norms of the International Humanitarian Law. The aim of this subject is for students to be familiar with content of provisions of international treaties and basic principles of IHL, as well as to adopt the necessary knowledge and techniques for solving issues of International Humanitarian Law in practice. They will deal with key questions arising from IHL for Law Enforcement Officials in democratic states, with maintenance of public order during international and non-international armed conflicts, as well as with provisions of IHL regarding war crimes, crimes against humanity and crime of genocide.
